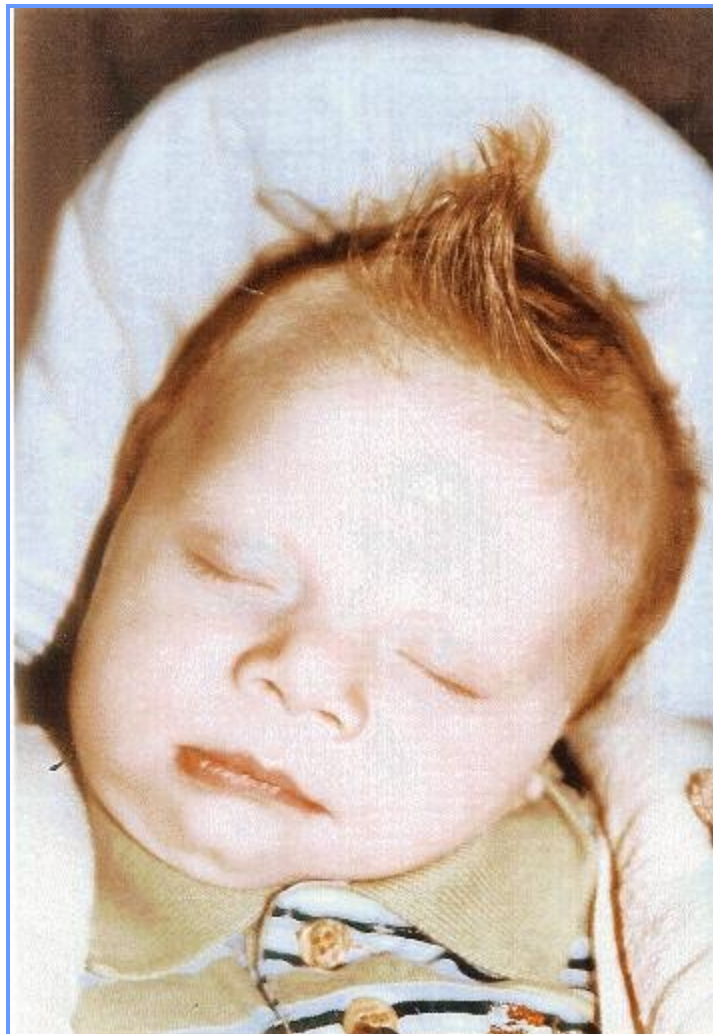

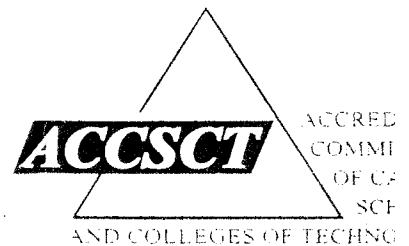

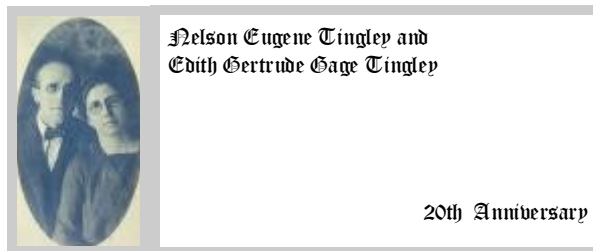

The first editors of **Tingley Times** were Betty Tingley Crowell and Glenn Wendell Ulrich so they will *always* be editors imprimis of **Tingley Times**. No other editor of **Tingley Times** will ever be editor imprimis. (See the banner at top of Page 1.)
